COLLINGBOURNE DUCIS PARISH COUNCIL

Peter Knowlson (01264 850812), Chairman, writes:

Season's Greetings to one and all. I'm sure many of you will be thinking like myself 'where did that year go?' Well it has almost gone but not before we get the chance to finish off the year with some festive celebrations:

Christmas Brunch – We will be holding the annual Christmas Brunch at Collingbourne Ducis Village Hall on Sunday the 9th December. As usual this will be a free event for Village residents where you can sit down and relax with friends and family over a cup of tea or coffee and your choice of bacon, sausage & egg rolls. As well as providing some entertainment, we will be holding a Christmas raffle so be sure to bring some pennies and fingers crossed to win a prize. If anybody in the meantime wishes to donate any prizes for the raffle, please contact me and I will arrange collection.

WW1 Commemoration – Although I was not able to attend in person, I understand the WW1 Centenary Anniversary Commemoration was a big success and I have been up to have a look at the new memorial walnut tree, and plaque, which was planted in honour of those who

lost their lives. Thank you to all those involved in making the day a success and bringing the Village together.

CDPC Project Consultation – Following the project consultation survey that the Parish Council ran throughout October we now have in the results of what projects / areas that the Village would most like the Parish Council to look at and have ranked them accordingly. These are available for you to see on the Village noticeboard and on the website. The top three, I can tell you, were looking at traffic calming options in Cadley Road, purchasing Outdoor Fitness Equipment for the recreation ground and the tidying up of footpaths and the cutting back of foliage. At our next Parish Council meeting we will be reviewing the projects / costs and putting a plan together for the next year and beyond. Thank you to all those people (seventy-five) who took time to respond to the survey.

Cadley Road – Following issues raised by the residents of Cadley Road about speeding traffic, we undertook a walk around with the Highways Engineers from Wiltshire County Council to have a look at Cadley Road and discuss potential options. Although a Metro count undertaken last year did not indicate significant speeding, residents of Cadley Road have continued to raise their concerns. We discussed with the Highways Engineers the possibilities of adding a footpath, and further traffic calming width restrictions, however Wiltshire Council like many have very little funds these days and these options would cost in the tens to hundreds of thousands and are simply not an option at this time. I also asked about additional 30 mph repeater signs but have been informed there is a system of street lighting throughout the length of the 30 mph restriction. This precludes the use of 30 mph speed limit repeater signs or road markings.

Wiltshire County Council's Principal Engineer has suggested that there may be the potential for a 'virtual footway'. These are areas of the carriageway marked for use by pedestrians with road markings, but still accessible for vehicles. These are typically used in environments where a physical footway cannot be located due to surrounding land constraint and certain other criteria are satisfied. As with all things, it has to be noted that it doesn't offer any increase in personal protection, but this does offer the opportunity to give drivers greater awareness of pedestrians.

I will be raising this option with my fellow Parish Councillors and will then request Wiltshire CC to carry out a technical assessment. In the meantime, the Parish Council is currently looking into the purchase of a Speed Indicator Device (SID) which could be mounted on street lighting poles with the option of additional brackets so that it can be moved around the village. The introduction of Village Gates which I do apologise for the length of time this is taking will also help as a visual for drivers that they are entering a built up area.

Village Gates - As per my comment above, I do apologise for the time it is taking to get our Village Gates installed. I don't think any of us on the Parish Council appreciated the time it would take or the amount of red tape it would be necessary to cut through just to get these installed. Although we had successfully obtained a quote from a manufacturer of village gates and provided the location details to Wiltshire County Council there were still various factors that they were not happy with and were unable to give the green light. Myself and Councillor Dave Dennis have since been to a CATG meeting, which is where highway issues are discussed, and have now requested Wiltshire County Council review the project and provide us with a proposal and estimate. We hope to receive the proposal and estimate before Christmas which can then be agreed and confirmed at the next CATG meeting on the 14th January.

Police Matters - There have been two dwelling burglaries reported in Collingbourne Ducis between 31st October and 2nd November. Whilst we thankfully live in an area of low crime, please do take extra care keeping your properties secure especially around this time of year.

On the 3rd of November we also had a very unpleasant incident where the Village Hall was vandalised and left in a state during an 18th birthday party. These people came from outside of the Village and created a night to forget for all those in the Village that are linked with the Village Hall. Following the incident, the Hall has been fully cleaned up and repaired. I attended a Village Hall Committee Meeting after the event and I can assure you that the Village Hall committee will be tightening up their hiring arrangements with the hope that this will not happen again.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be at Collingbourne Ducis Village Hall and is due to take place at 7 pm on Thursday 3rd January. All members of the Parish are welcome to attend.

If you can possibly come along please do. It is your chance to voice an opinion on your magazine.


COLIN WARD 1946-2018


The new noticeboards had been delivered and were awaiting installation, and appreciation for the role played by Steve Clements in obtaining and fixing them for a minimal cost was minuted.



At our October meeting Ray Broughton gave us lots of helpful and inexpensive tips with things usually obtainable from our kitchen cupboards. He told us that secateurs should be cleaned once a month with tomato ketchup; the blades should be liberally



covered and left for twenty-four hours, then scrape off the hardened deposit and wash, dry and oil immediately. You can clean your hedge cutter in the same manner. If you are sowing black seeds coat them with corn-flour first so that they can be seen on the soil. Do not store your hosepipe under the greenhouse staging as in the spring the lining gives off a gas which kills cuttings.

'Bound by Veterans' Charity Seeks Public Votes To Have A Share In Tesco's Bag Fund

The Woodborough-based charity Bound by Veterans, which teaches the skills of bookbinding to Wounded, Injured and Sick (WIS) ex-service men and women, is seeking



public support in the Tesco 'Bags of Help' initiative. The charity (which begun in 2012) has found that learning bookbinding skills has a therapeutic and restorative effect on ex-service men and women who have been medically discharged for a variety of reasons. It helps them come to terms with their medical conditions and begin to return to normal life. They can also gain City and Guilds qualifications.

The Bound by Veterans charity has been selected to be one of three groups shortlisted to take part in the Tesco initiative and the public can vote when they shop at Tesco shops in Amesbury (Superstore), Durrington (Express), Tidworth (Superstore) and Ludgershall (Express) during the months of November and December 2018. The three groups taking part will be rewarded either £4000, £2000 or £1000 depending on the number of votes cast for each.

The challenge for Bound by Veterans is to train in the fifty two weeks of 2019, fifty-two Wounded, Injured or Sick (WIS) veterans. The support from the Tesco Bag Fund will help the charity enormously to achieve its goal.

The Bound by Veterans charity was begun in 2012 by Jonathan Powell, a former army officer (and now a bookbinder) and Rob Shepherd from Shepherd's Bookbinders. It runs courses throughout the year from monthly short introduction courses at Tedworth House, the rehabilitation centre in Tidworth, to more advanced courses which can lead up to City and Guilds qualifications Levels 1-3.

Bound by Veterans courses are free to all those who have been discharged early from the services because of their wounds, injuries or sickness. It is also open to spouses and partners of WIS veterans and those who are in transition awaiting a medical board.

COOKERY CORNER

Paul Herinx writes:

Here's an old recipe that began as 'nursery food'
- something to be served just for the children –
but which over the years has proved to be a
really useful basis for all sorts of things – we
have used it for a vegetarian main meal, or as



small savouries, or 'starters'. It is also extremely simple to make, with no bechamel sauce base, or anything like that, so it's ideal for children's cooking or for people who are just starting cooking. It's surprising how good it is, if you use good cheese and flavour it well.

NANNY'S CHEESE PUDDING

Ingredients

½ pint fresh white breadcrumbs ½ pint milk

1-2 tbsp of olive oil or melted butter 2 eggs

1/4 lb grated cheddar cheese or other mature hard cheese

1 tsp mixed or ready mixed mustard;

Seasoning: any or several of the following to your taste, salt, pepper, paprika or chilli powder, celery-seed or celery salt; chopped onion, finely chopped rasher of bacon, anchovy paste or a couple of anchovies, chopped herbs, such as basil or sage etc. Finely grated cheese (parmesan is nice) to sprinkle on top.

Method

Mix grated cheese and crumbs. Boil the milk, and pour it over the crumb mix with the oil or butter.

Stir well, and leave for a minute or so. Stir again before going on. Beat the eggs and add to the crumb mix with your chosen seasonings and stir well. Pour into a deepish dish (it rises a lot), sprinkle plentifully with cheese and bake in a hottish oven (200C) until risen,



firm, and golden. Eat while it's hot. Either by itself, or (for example) with a tomato salad.

Ironically, it's now my turn for surgery. I've got prostate cancer, though by the time you read this I'll hopefully have it all in a little jar. It's a trying thing for blokes, who naturally want to hide from the concept of any surgery in that area especially if it is going to involve loss of function of the waterworks and one's love life for an unknown period.

It's not helped by the inability of doctors to predict how things are going to turn out. They simply can't. There is no scan that will tell you the future and even when the surgeon goes in for a look, they still can't predict your recovery beyond whether they got the cancer or not.

This means a lack of information, which is in itself a worry.

I wasn't diagnosed by regular testing because I didn't think it was necessary. I had absolutely no symptoms. No pain, things were absolutely fine. I could have gone on until it broke out, at which point I would be stuffed.

So there are two ways you can save a life here: If you're a bloke, and you're near the big 50, get tested. If you know a bloke like that who edges away from the idea, encourage them to get tested. Talk to the GP and have a look at https://www.prostatecanceruk.org if you're on the internet.

We are approaching the season of goodwill, and for some strange reason my mind keeps returning to the ancient Greeks. There are accounts of clear bad-will, poets who wrote such evil poems that whole families committed suicide. We have the same today on social media, an unfortunate truth about the power of words. In the bible it sadly says, 'there is nothing new under the sun'.

Everyone has a basic right to be respected as a fellow human being. Our first instinct should be to say how good a person is. It is intellectually cheap and nasty to find fault; small-minded was the traditional term. Invariably the fault we find is the fault we share. We can choose not to judge as Jesus did when he said, 'Let him who is without sin cast the first stone'.
