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THE VIEW FROM EVERLEIGH

We continue to make good progress on our Everleigh Enhancement plans: flower planters are now in position at the playground, in The Street, in West View, on Marlborough Road and in Lower Everleigh. These flower planters are adopted by adjacent residents who volunteer to maintain them. The Parish Council supply the planter, soil and plants; adopters then water, feed and weed them. Any resident wishing to donate plants or adopt a planter would be most welcome; donations can be left at Laburnum/Ivy Cottage opposite the village noticeboard at The Street/A342 junction. In particular we are looking for an adopter in Lower Everleigh.

We are also developing a village street map primarily to assist delivery drivers. A draft prototype is on display in the bus shelter until 15th June for villagers to view and make comment. Please respond with any comments to Cllr Terry Martin at temmet2001@doctors.org.uk

Our village celebration of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee takes place on Thursday 2nd June at the playground/Jubilee field, starting at 5 pm. The event will consist of a BBQ and games/activities such as egg and spoon races, relay races, rounders, volleyball, badminton, golf pitch and putt, and coconut shy. Festivities will culminate with the lighting of a bonfire beacon at 9.45 pm to synchronise with beacons across the nation. We will be setting up from 9.30 am on the day; all volunteers are welcome.

The Collingbourne Ducis St Andrew's Church Fete takes place this year on Saturday 3rd September from 12 noon until 4 pm in the Ducis Village Hall and on the recreation ground. Everleigh has been invited to participate in fun games activities with Ducis and Kingston folk at this fete. More details will follow in due course.

Have you visited the mobile library in Everleigh recently? It visits The Street in Everleigh (High Trees lay-by) on a Wednesday every 4 weeks between 12.25 – 12.55 pm. For adults, there are a large range of novels, ranging from the latest thriller to best-selling autobiographies, cookery and gardening. There will be plenty of entertainment to cater for all ages. The hot topic on the streets appears to be who will be crowned the Champion Ladies, Gentleman's and Youth Cake decorators – Could it be you? The organising committee have requested



wonderful weather from the MET Office and we do hope that this comes through for us!

I am delighted to announce that, with the recent additions of Thom and Kelly Earle joining our Councillor team, our Parish Council is now at full capacity with all 11 allocated positions filled. Kelly has immediately got her hands dirty leading on the redesign of our website which is set to be up and running around the time this Courier Edition is published. A huge thank you to everyone who completed the website survey we recently published - your feedback directly influenced the choices we've made on the website, including adding a news section and events calendar. This is as much a community platform as it is a place for the Parish Council to share transparency, and we would love your involvement. Let us know what events you have coming up or if you'd like to contribute to writing. We're also launching a logo competition! So do have a look at the website, draw a sketch and send in your ideas.

Following the Annual Parish Council Meeting held on 5th May, we have taken the opportunity to reorganise and better align Councillor responsibilities and liaison roles going forward. As we have now moved away from COVID-19 restrictions, the Parish Council will focus on re-energising and revitalising our links with Wiltshire Council, Wiltshire Police and other groups supporting the community to ensure that we can be as responsive as we can be to local issues and needs. Improving our links with Wiltshire Police, which had taken a significant hit during COVID-19 restrictions, will be a key focus. In addition, reflecting the wider issues affecting us all, the Parish Council has voted to establish an Environment and Sustainability Committee to ensure we remain focused in these important areas in the conduct of our work and decision we make.

With the installation of the Everleigh Road Bus Shelter, the long list of signature projects the Parish Council had planned to deliver on has been completed (some of you may remember the Survey we published

in 2018 which informed these). Look out for a new survey aligned to the next Courier Edition again seeking your views to shape future projects you wish the Parish Council to deliver on. All ideas will be welcome.

Our next Parish Council Meeting is scheduled for 14th July 2022 at 7.00 pm at Collingbourne Village Hall. As ever, Parish Council Meetings are open events, which members of the public are more than welcome to attend. 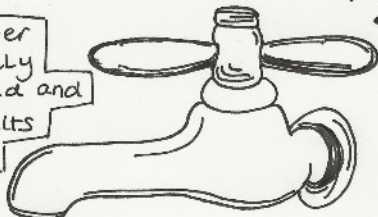

THINGS I HAVE FOUND IN THE GARDEN

Videos show that the projectile actually has to get quite close to a russian tank to completely obliterate it. And the US Javelin is even worse, having a defect similar to the old Sten gun. As all of you who own a Sten will already know, this sub-machine gun, (bits of old pipe welded together in dark rooms by the visually impaired at ten bob a go) has an incurable habit of firing high and to the right. The Javelin (\$137,000,000 per bang) fires low and to the left meaning the

I have written to Liz Truss asking if we could not oppress Scotland and Wales a bit in the hope of affronting these companies' corporate sensibilities and thus cause them to withdraw from England. I also suggested we ban the import of Caerphilly and Scottish cheddar as I know Liz is mad for anything which gets foreign cheese off our shelves. She wrote back thanking me for my kind thoughts and said the government was already doing all it could in regard to Scotland and Wales, but that those were not foreign cheeses and my idea was inane. Which is fair comment as I never think very deeply before formulating new ideas and opinions. Saves time.

Breaking news: For those of you who are worried about the future security of Europe I am reliably informed, by the chap who was next to me in the queue at Tesco's, that Nato is finalising its application to join Ukraine. So, no worries, eh.

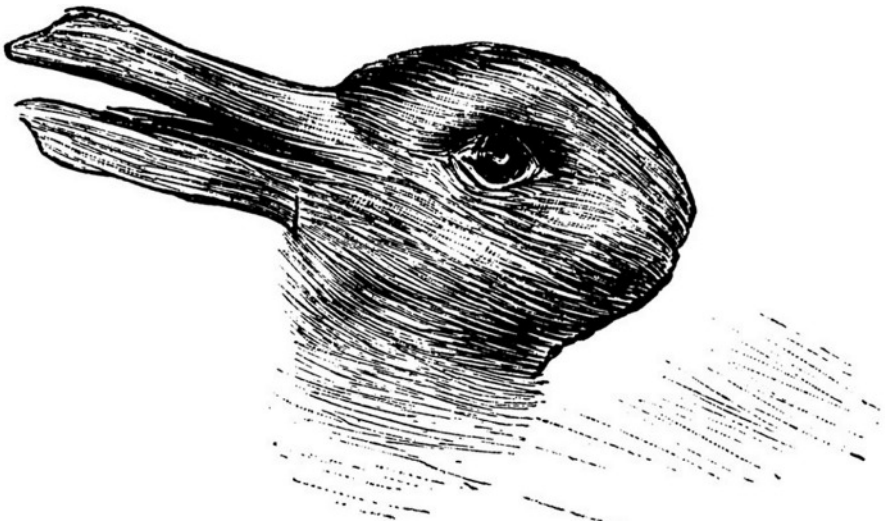

Refugees and Poverty

These two topics are at the forefront of my mind at present. We are facing something quite unprecedented with the complex global crises that we hear so much about.

*'no one leaves home unless
home is the mouth of a shark'*

The quote comes from an incredibly moving poem called 'Home' written by Warsan Shire. It is born out of the experience of a refugee and requires a strong stomach to read.

Last night I was at a meeting with people who are hosting Ukrainian Refugees. As the refugees arrive the need for both the hosts and the refugees to be supported and avoid isolation is uppermost. If you are hosts, can I urge you to get in touch.

'It is a common condition of being poor...you are always afraid that the good things in your life are temporary, that someone can take them away, because you have no power beyond your own brute strength to stop them'. — Rick Bragg, journalist

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Surely this is equally true of those who we are welcoming into our communities! As a child I was often hungry but never starving, often cold but there were always more blankets, daily bathing was with a sink and flannel in lukewarm water. It is important that we who are relatively comfortable do not forget. I still have a fear that the good things are transient, but as C.S. Lewis says: 'Nothing that you have not given away will ever really be yours'.

Let us hope that we see again the remarkable generosity of our communities that we saw during the pandemic. As people struggle to make ends meet, we are already facing something that goes beyond a tightening of belts and will probably go beyond the experiences of most of us. With both of these issues, it is not a matter of responding immediately but rather that we are prepared and by being prepared we are ready to help.

I look forward to watching evil being destroyed in our communities,

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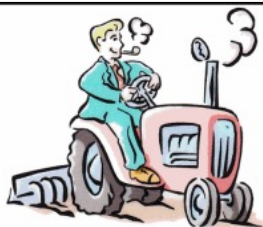
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
