Chairman John Wood writes:

The sad passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II has dominated the news and provided a period of reflection for us all. News came too late to cancel the Parish Council meeting which was held in the Village Hall in Collingbourne Ducis. Elections for the Chairman and Vice Chairman were held with Councillor John Wood elected to the Chair and Councillor Steve Lyons as Vice Chair.



Councillor Lyons provided an upbeat report on the general maintenance of the village, particularly the efforts of the new Parish Steward who has posted a number of before and after pictures of the work he has been conducting in the village. Steve intends to engage with the Sparkle Team in the Autumn to coincide with a village litter pick scheduled for 30th October: all volunteers will be welcome.

The Village Fete and Tri-Village Tournament successfully took place on Saturday 3rd September. The weather gods shone on the village green and captained by Councillor Bell the Collingbourne Ducis team prevailed to retain the Cup. Well done Karen and her team of helpers and all of the athletes, participants, supporters and villagers who ventured out and entered into the fun and spirit of the event. The next date for your calendar is the annual Christmas Big Brunch to be held on 11th December; if you wish to make a donation for the prize draw raffle held at the Big Brunch please contact Councillor Bell through the Parish Council website.

On the Speed Watch front the good news is that Wiltshire Police have issued Collingbourne Ducis with their own equipment; unfortunately though, the camera has had to be sent back for essential maintenance but is expected to be returned soon. In the interim we will continue to share the equipment issued to Collingbourne Kingston as before. Co-ordinated by Paul Hartley, the Speed Watch Team is always on the look

out for willing volunteers: training is provided and the bigger the team, the greater the presence on the A338.

Thank you to all who responded to the flyer inviting ideas for future projects for the Parish. Councillor Earle has taken the lead of a working group to review the results of the survey and collate the ideas into costed projects to be considered at the next Parish Council meeting.

Goodness knows how Becky chose the winners in each category! Thank you to Gill McIntyre, once again, for donating the Baxter Trophy for the best dog in the show, which was won by Sue Hunsley and her dog, Maisie. Finally, the hotly contested Tri-Village-Tournament. So much fun was had by young and not so young contestants! The repair and restoration of the clockface has been quoted at £2,200. A total of £7,700 for both projects. An update of the amount of the Church Clock Fund will also be given in next month's Courier.

COLLINGBOURNES ROAD SAFETY WORKING GROUP (CRSWG)

On Wednesday August 31st 2022 the 'walkabout' with Danny Kruger MP and Dr Mark McClelland, the Wiltshire Council Cabinet Minister

for Transport, Waste, Street Scene and Flooding, took place. Like all these sorts of meetings time was of the essence and I had their attention for about an hour. During that time I showed them the following danger points in the two villages:

1. Canal/Railway bridges north of Burbage *
2. Aughton junction turnout onto the A338 *
3. East footway of A338 around St Mary's Church, Collingbourne Kingston
4. Chapel Lane turnout onto A338
5. Site of recent HGV fire Collingbourne Kingston near Five Farthings, Collingbourne Kingston
6. Site of the double fatality between Collingbourne Ducis and Collingbourne Kingston, and demolished village gates following a damage only accident
7. 30mph to 40mph to 30mph limits between Collingbourne Ducis and Collingbourne Kingston
8. Narrow footway by village shop Collingbourne Ducis
9. National speed limit into 30mph limit and virtual footway at entrance to Collingbourne Ducis from direction of Shears Inn *
10. Site of recent Home Bargains -v- Bourne incident
11. Church bends HGV impasse, Collingbourne Ducis
12. Site of Eloise Jackson fatality in Collingbourne Ducis

Obviously several of these danger points could not be visited in the time available and these are marked with an asterisk, but those that we did visit did not disappoint on the day, and neither did the HGV traffic, which prompted the comment from Dr Mark McClelland 'Is it always this busy?'. I explained that it was and in fact is even more busy during term-time and rush hours.

In the meantime there is another date for your diary. Danny Kruger MP is meeting with us again, as promised. At the meeting will be similar panellists as at the last meeting. The meeting will be on Thursday December 1st 2022 at Collingbourne Kingston Village Hall at 19:30. At this meeting he will be re-

porting back on the list of action points that he and the other panellists took away from the July meeting. Be there to keep the progress moving.

On Thursday July 28th about 120 people met in Collingbourne Kingston Village Hall, only eighteen days after a Home Bargains HGV plunged into the Bourne ditch in Collingbourne Ducis. Now, as I write this, only two days have passed since a six-axled HGV appeared to have spontaneously combusted on the A338 just yards from my house. This incident followed a catalogue of similar events over the last four years, namely: the motorcyclist killed just outside Aughton (2019); the double fatality between Ducis and Kingston (2020); the tragic death of Eloise Jackson (2021); incidents of vehicles crashing into roadside properties, Mayzells Cottage (2019), Barleycorn/57 Collingbourne Kingston (2020), the Kingston village gates outside Fesdu (2021); accident outside Hillview Garage (2022). This sequence of events should give you cause for serious concern about road safety in these villages.

The Public Meeting I referred to above was with Danny Kruger MP, Philip Wilkinson OBE the PCC for Wiltshire, Peter Binley Interim Head of Highways and Transport for Wiltshire Council, Chris Williams, Local Councillor for Ludgershall North and Rural, and Assistant Chief Constable David Minty QPM. The purpose was to publicly put across our feelings about the A338, and to see if change is possible and what that change might be. Full notes of the meeting have been made available so I won't go into them here. Various actions came out of the meeting and these are being co-ordinated by Danny Kruger MP. Perhaps most notably in the short term is the intention to get and I to see the danger points in our villages in August/September.

However the feeling that I get from the majority of people that I speak to is one of anger mixed with resolution at living along this road with its appalling safety record, speeding problem, and thundering HGVs. Some people seem to think that its 'my fault after all I bought a house here, no one forced me'. To counter that argument, I'd say that you may like the situation as it is now but let me assure you that once the

old Honda site is developed by Panattoni, a logistics company, at a cost of £700m into a 145 hectare logistics and manufacturing centre, you may have second thoughts, because much of the traffic to and from it will be coming this way.

Others say, 'I heard all this before, we've tried but nothing ever happens' again I'd say, that may have been the case then, but this is now, lets try again, and again, and again. The more we try the more likely that some of those who are elected to represent us, will have to help if they want to be re-elected by us.

So, here we are, one year into my campaign that I started after the death of my little friend Eloise Jackson and for whose memory I personally have been making this stand. I have built a relationship of sorts with Danny Kruger MP and intend to use it to get him to represent us. It is early days but I intend to keep him to his word. But this is a Herculean task, not one that a single person can do, so I am appealing for help, and throwing it open to you. It may be that you have a skill set in your day job that will be useful, or some time on your hands to help carry out a lorry count, proof reading to make sure that our apostrophes are all in the correct place or just that you want to know whats going on with the campaign. We are launching a new improved Facebook Page with the above name for villagers to sign up to. This should give you the latest on the campaign. Of course we'd love to hear your suggestions, views and near miss experiences on the A338, perhaps even dashcam footage of them. It all helps to build up the picture. However the FB page is no place to be discourteous or rude to others participating, however disparate your opinion on the subject may be.

I do hope that you will get involved, the aim is to improve road safety and quality of life for all of us To make a change you have to be part

THE STORY OF SILAS BARLOW – CONTINUED...

Val Patrick writes:

In last month's *Courier*, you will have read the excerpt from the *Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette* for the 8th April 1858 about a twelve-year-old boy named Silas Barlow who caused a conflagration at Joseph Hill's property. He was found guilty and was sentenced to five years in the Wiltshire Reformatory School at Warminster.

Silas was in fact fourteen at the time and had lied about his age, probably to receive as light a sentence as possible. His life of crime began at Mount Orleans Farm where he was one of the eight boys employed by Mr Hill the farmer. He did in fact serve his five years at the Reform School where he was taught tailoring, a skill he never used.

Baptised in Collingbourne Ducis in December 1843, he was the son of Samuel and Jane Barlow of Sunton. Seven years after leaving the school, he married a local girl, Sarah Ellen Smith, three years his junior, who was the daughter of a carpenter named Alfred Smith. The following year, in 1871, their daughter Fanny Sabina was born. A son William Henry arrived in 1874, also in Collingbourne Ducis, or rather in Collingbourne Kingston as Sunton was at that time, but died shortly after.

By then, Silas had struck up a relationship with another local girl, this time eight years his junior, named Ellen Sloper. Ellen too may have had a troubled life. Quite why she was being brought up by her Matthews grandparents at Shears Cottages in 1861 isn't clear. After that, her life went downhill, and ten years later, she was in Pewsey Union Workhouse. From there she went into service near Stroud in Gloucestershire. The affair flourished, almost certainly in the knowledge that Silas was a married man, as they had all known each other while growing up in the village. He moved to live in Battersea, London with his cousin David, and worked as a plate layer on the South Western Railway.

The affair resulted in the birth of a daughter, Harriet Ellen Barlow, born in Cheltenham in March 1876. Interestingly, Silas's wife Sarah had died the Christmas before in Collingbourne Ducis, aged twenty-nine, but of what? Her daughter was from then on brought up by grandparents.

After the birth of Harriet, Ellen Sloper and her baby moved to Vauxhall in London, to be near Silas. He paid for her rented room and she was passed off as Mrs Smith. He called himself Mr Smith although his latest child had taken the name Barlow.

Silas visited Ellen regularly, but in late autumn 1876, she became increasingly unwell, having been medicated by Silas. Her excruciating death took place shortly after in the presence of her landlady Mrs Wilson. It didn't take long for Silas to be arrested, to undergo a lengthy trial at the Old Bailey, and to be convicted on the 20th of November for Ellen's murder by Strychnine poisoning. Several newspapers reported the crime.

After Ellen died, Silas had taken baby Harriet, supposedly to place her in a safe home, but she was found dead in Battersea reservoir shortly after. He was never indicted for Harriet's death but was hanged for Ellen's murder within the walls of Surrey Prison, Horsemonger Lane, London, on the 19th of December 1876.

(This serves two, so scale up as required.)

Ingredients:

2 slices of Goats' Cheese about 150g each

About 20 red seedless grapes

150g smoked pancetta, either pre-chopped or cut into matchsticks

2 slices sourdough or other good country bread (about 1,5cm thick) cut into 1,5cm cubes

Your favourite baby salad leaves, peppery mixtures including rocket are good

ReModena Blueberry Infused Balsamic

Extra Virgin Olive Oil & Unsalted Butter

Sea Salt and Fresh Black Pepper (use a grinder)

Method:

Preheat the oven to 170 fan. Put grapes in a small baking dish, drizzle with olive oil. Bake in the oven until the grapes start to wrinkle (about 20 minutes but keep an eye on them). When done, remove and set aside.

In a frying pan, toast the croutons on medium heat in a mixture of butter and oil until golden, drain, retaining the fat and set aside.

In the same fat, fry the pancetta until caramelized, lowering the heat part way through. Drain & keep warm.

Scatter the salad leaves on your serving plates. Increase heat under frying pan and cook goats' cheese slices in the same fat, sprinkle with black pepper, turn and ensure browning but not too oozy.

Distribute the pancetta, croutons and grapes over leaves, mix together lightly, top with goats' cheese and then drizzle with the Blueberry Balsamic.

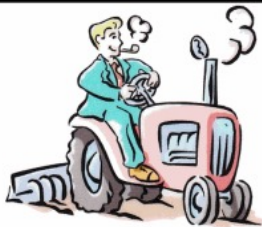
